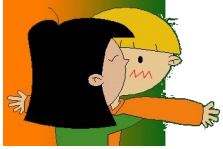
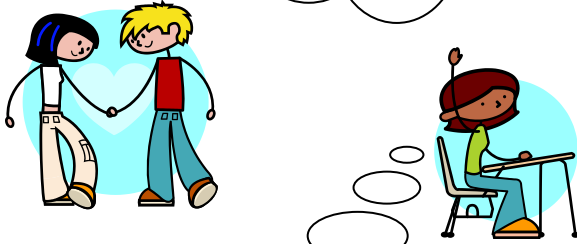


What is Sexual Assault?

Being forced to kiss someone



Being touched when you don't want to be



Being forced to touch or look at someone's private parts (genitals)



Forced sex (intercourse)

Sexual Assault is Against the Law!

It is sexual assault even if the person who touches you is:

- A person who helps you — for example, caregiver, attendant, interpreter, doctor, therapist
- A person you know — for example, boyfriend, girlfriend, husband, neighbour, co-worker, friend
- A stranger (person you do not know)
- A family member — for example, cousin, brother, father, uncle, mother
- The same sex (gender)

No one has the right to touch you if you don't want.

Without permission (consent), it is Sexual Assault.



Need Help? If yes, you can:

- Tell someone you trust: friend, teacher, doctor, nurse, relative, counsellor.
- Go to the hospital, see a doctor or go to a clinic.

- Call the police. *Do not bathe or shower if you are reporting sexual assault.*

You have the right to:

Ask for an Interpreter



Ask for a rape crisis worker to accompany you



Wheelchair access (including washrooms).

Understand medical and police Procedures.
